- (2) Small PHA A PHA that is not designated as PHAS or SEMAP troubled, that owns or manages less than 250 public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550.
- (3) Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) Standard PHA A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS and SEMAP assessments.
- (5) Troubled PHA A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) Qualified PHA A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

	1. Expanding Affordable Housing Supply MRHA VI has made significant strides toward increasing the availability of affordable housing within its jurisdiction. Our efforts include both acquisition and new construction projects aimed at addressing local housing shortages. We are actively exploring opportunities to partner with developers, secure land parcels, and utilize federal, state, and local funding sources to facilitate these initiatives, with a strategic focus on Claiborne Simpson, and Warren counties.				
	We are committed to leveraging a mix of public and private funds to expand assisted housing options for our residents. This includes applying for grants, low-interest loans, and tax incentives to develop new units and renovate existing structures. In 2023, we were awarded an \$850,000 Affordable Housing Program (AHP) grant from the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas, which provided additional funding for the substantial rehabilitation of Pattison Homes I & II located in Claiborne County. In 2024, Pattison Homes I & II was awarded a subsequent Affordable Housing Program (AHP) grant from the Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta in the amount of \$1,000,000 to fund the construction of a new waste water treatment system for the development.				
	We are nearing the completion of a substantial rehabilitation project in Claiborne County, Pattison Homes I & II. We are transforming a vacant, decadelong unused property into a sustainable 40-unit affordable single-family housing community. This property was donated to MRHA VI by the Claiborne County Board of Supervisors in January 2021. The project, with an estimated cost of \$3.9 million, will be completed by the end of 2025.				
	2. Enhancing Assisted Housing Opportunities MRHA VI is actively preparing for full compliance with both HOTMA and NSPIRE mandates to ensure high standards of service, transparency, and housing quality for residents through our Housing Choice Voucher program. MRHA VI has significantly increased its project based voucher allocations over the past several years. From 2021 to present, we have partnered with multiple affordable housing developers to provide project based rental assistance for approximately 169 households throughout our jurisdiction.				
	3. Increasing Assisted Housing Choices for Clients				
	Our Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program continues to prioritize building strong relationships with landlords to expand housing options for voucher recipients. Moreover, we are reviewing and adjusting payment standards where practicable to ensure voucher subsidies remain competitive and attractive to landlords, thus broadening the housing options available to our clients.				
	4. Improving Quality of Life and Promoting Economic Vitality				
	 a) Promoting Better Living Environments: We actively encourage and support initiatives aimed at maintaining and improving the physical conditions of our housing communities. b) Supporting Multifamily Residents: We are implementing new services and activities tailored to foster community engagement, safety, and resident satisfaction. a) Fostering Self-Sufficiency: Our Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program continues to grow, providing critical services such as job training, employment assistance, and financial literacy education. In March 2023, we reestablished our in-house WIN Center to offer job search resources, resume assistance, and career counseling. Partnership with Operation Hope enhances our clients' financial literacy, credit improvement, and entrepreneurial ventures, empowering families toward economic independence. On February 28, 2025, our FSS Program received increased grant funding allowing the addition of one new FSS Coordinator and an increase in our minimum program participants from 100 to 125. The FSS staff is working to increase its program coordinating committee (PCC), FSS activities, and support services.
